## Abstract

Slavery, empathy and pornography takes a shocking new look at the debates in England 1780-1865. Wood asserts that slavery not only shaped the novel but also the pornography of the period. The book is interdisciplinary, incorporating materials ranging from literary criticism to film studies. This is a major new publication. The central chapters cross-examine the slavery writings of Harriet Martineau, John Ruskin and Thomas Carlyle. Many new examples are given, for example Caryl Phillips's 'Crossing the River' is read against the work of Robert Mapplethorpe.
