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The book is an ethnographic exploration of how 'democratic process shapes the nature of popular politics. It centres on how the vernacularisation of democracy has become one of the most assertive and politically powerful processes in contemporary India. The Vernacularisation of Democracy is a vivid account of how the vernacularisation of democracy is a process of challenging conventional theories of democratisation that 'democratic orders' is situated within a wider process of the vernacularisation of democracy in which values and practices of democracy become embedded in the social process become entrenched in the consciousness of ordinary people. The author witnessed an upsurge in the political participation of local leaders from humble social backgrounds who present themselves as representatives of underprivileged communities.
