The subtitle of Professor David Crouch’s book adumbrates both its theme and its argument. His subject is the process through which, by the end of Henry III’s reign, a closely defined noble class, organised in hierarchical

groups, had evolved from the undifferentiated aristocracy characteristic of Domesday England. He sees this process as one common to the whole francophone world, although it had its own local variants, and one which in England gathered special momentum between about 1180 and 1220. It was during or shortly after this period that the knights emerged as a self-conscious and clearly demarcated sub-group among the nobility, that earls and barons began to speak of themselves as peers, and that the magnates acquired a political agenda which, in setting them against the king, helped to define them as a class.
