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THE RE-ENCHANTMENT OF POETRY AS THERAPY

My feeling is that poetry is also a healing process, and then when a person tries to write poetry with depth or beauty, he will find himself guided along paths which will heal him, and this is more important, actually, than any of the poetry he writes.

My earliest recollections of poetry are from childhood. My father (usually at my mother's request) would recite poems before bedtime. Did they use poetry as a sedative? Was it a form of hypnosis? Surely it put all five children into a state of trance. I vividly remember sitting with my siblings on our long staircase and listening to poetic verses. Many times I did not even understand the poem—but the energy, enthusiasm, laughter and phonetic sounds entertained us at some preconscious level. My dad loved both reading and reciting long narrative and lyrical poems from memory. Both my mother and father would send poems to family and friends. Recently I found a humorous one, among some treasured letters, entitled *Growth Signs or "How To Tell You Are Growing Older"* copied (1981) from the County Engineers Association of California Newsletter. I have made copies and sent them to friends and family. Like a treasured patchwork quilt passed on from generation to generation, a poem can be a legacy to value and recall memories of family and friends. I believe my parents

intuited Voltaire's dictum: "Poetry is the music of the soul."

How did I get involved in poetry therapy? As Senior Psychotherapist for an acute care psychiatric unit (Los Angeles Daniel Freeman Marina Hospital) my primary responsibility is diagnosis, assessment and treatment of adolescent and adult patients. In this therapeutic milieu I first encountered a pioneer of poetry therapy, Arthur Lerner, Ph.D., RPT. When I inquired about poetry therapy (Heninger, 1981, 1996; Leedy, 1973; Lerner, 1975, 1981, 1996) and what exactly was meant by "RPT," he invited me to attend a few sessions with different groups. We shared sessions on our I.C.U., the well known Exodus-Chemical Dependency Unit, and Adolescent Treatment Units. In each group I observed first-hand the effectiveness of this powerful therapeutic tool. I observed Dr. Lerner using a variety of poems and evoking poetry from patients.

For example, one patient we will call Joan, aged mid-sixties, with multiple somatic injuries from two
