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One Too Many: An Exploration C Literacy Of Older African Americ Carolina Before Brown Versus Th Education

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Abstract

Drawing from 1992 data, The National Adult Literacy Survey reported that a large portion of the US population lacks the literacy skills typical of the general population. The survey also indicated that the reading proficiency of African Americans was lower than that of the White population, particularly within the same age groups. A similar picture emerges in the more recent report, Literacy in America, from the 2003 National Assessment of Adult Literacy. As a group, older adults ages 65 and older had the lowest average prose, document, and basic literacy (Kutner, et al., 2003).

In the State of South Carolina, over half the population is estimated to be at literacy levels 1 or 2. Less than half of the African American students assessed in the study indicate that they are proficient or above on state reading assessments, especially among older residents in the southeastern states, although there is considerable research that links these levels of literacy to educational attainment, there is little scholarship that explores the inter-generational foundation for this situation in terms of literacy materials. This study addresses this topic using data from annual reports of the South Carolina State Superintendent of Education between 1992 and 2003 to describe the slow progression of public school library service in South Carolina, including the number of schools that blacks could attend, the cost per pupil in these schools, representative monetary expenditures on library professional staff, and other related issues. Through interviews with African Americans, between the ages of 69 to 96, who attended a segregated school with no school library; this study explores the impact of these literacy situations have played in their lives and the lives of their children.
