Abstract

This book is a unique collection of diplomatic and military documents for the years leading up to the outbreak. It brings together newly-discovered documents as well as many not previously available in English, drawn from sources and countries. It is an essential collection for anyone studying the origins of the First World War.

The collection contains several hundred international documents, selected because they are vital to understand remaining controversies on the war's origins. The volume includes a detailed scholarly introduction which analyses controversial issues in the debate on the origins of the First World War on the eve of the centenary. It also provides the history of the publication of official document collections on the war's origins. The documents are then divided into two volumes: the first covering the period 1911-1914; the second addressing the July Crisis and immediate outbreak of war.

The First World War continues to fascinate scholars, students and the general public. Anyone studying the origins of the war finds this collection indispensable. Documents are an essential component of historical study, particularly for this collection which historians have argued for the best part of a century. The documents in this volume are thoroughly cross-annotated, and presented with authoritative commentary. It allows readers to make connections between the decisions for war were made, and why.
