

Introducing Irreligious Experiences.

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Abstract:

Reports of an emphatic awareness of the absence of God, or of unexplainable feelings of elation or despair at the non-existence, are well-documented from both believers and nonbelievers alike. Such irreligious experiences are unknown, even among those engaged in the academic study of their "religious" counterparts. The purpose of this study is to shed some light on an unjustly neglected phenomenon in the social sciences and religious studies. Although other studies have focused on the focus here is on fifteen contemporary case-studies (given in full as an appendix to the article).
