Ely's recent book, *The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court: John Marshall, 1799-1835*, is an important contribution to political theory and the history of the Supreme Court, is that it provides an important perspective on the Court at a time when it played a much different role in American history than it does today. In particular, the Fuller Court played active roles in promoting economic growth and in fostering commerce, while the modern Court has largely abandoned these obligations in these regards.
